

"NEIGHBOR LOVING"

We talk about our neighbors a lot in church. Have you noticed?

One of the things I have really appreciated about being an interim pastor with Shepherd of the Hills is how all this talk about the neighbors is also put into action: Meals on Wheels operates out of our building every week day keeping our neighbors fed and visited; Mental Health Connect is expanding its work in our community helping our neighbors access vital healthcare; and a family of 5 asylum seekers lives in our parsonage where they are safe and working toward a better life.

If you worship and serve at SOTH, you can probably extend that list for pages! The Annual Report bears witness to that. As you prepare for the Annual Meeting and a new senior pastor, I'd like to share a few neighbor-loving observations:

- You are not the only lovers/givers/doers in the neighborhood. There will always be more needs than can be met but there will also be more love-sharers than you might think. So, be as generous in sharing opportunities as you are in sharing responsibilities. Sometimes, the best way for a congregation to meet a neighborhood need is to set it down or let it go, which empowers other groups or individuals looking to step in. This is a nervewracking decision in the best of times, and even more so in 2023 as volunteerism wanes. The temptation to do more is one we learned from Pharaoh in the Bible: make more bricks! Working harder burns us out faster. Instead of welcoming new members for their uniqueness, we see them as next-in-line to do what has already exhausted us. Trust that the love you share with your neighborhood will grow and reproduce itself, especially when you get out of its way.
- If you notice your needs going unmet, check on your neighbors. The pandemic upended a lot of systems in the world, our communities and our individual lives. It's still hard to know what will return to the way it was before the pandemic and what will break down completely or break out in new and exciting ways. Grief, anxiety, excitement and curiosity have been careen through our days. Your new senior pastor will join you midstream of all this. SOTH has a marvelous history of healthy, vibrant relationships between the congregation and the pastors and staff, and I'm certain this will continue with your next senior pastor. If there are choppy days—and there often are—check if the choppiness comes from how new or different needs are being met. As noted above, it's difficult to be all things to all people, and sometimes the pain of what you miss is lessened

by the joy of what others are discovering. Check on your neighbors: Are they finding joy or connection or comfort through the life of this congregation? SOTH has an impressive history of reaching out to new people and embracing the changes that come with growth. Lean into that history, it has served you well.

• Upgrade the Golden Rule to Platinum. The golden rule is to do unto others as you'd have them do unto you; the platinum rule is to do unto others as they'd want done unto them. It is a common mistake we've probably all made: You love being hugged, so you want to share love by hugging others, but if they feel love through acts of service, a hug will never mean as much as covering extra chores. To expect our neighbors to want the kind of love we're showing them is privileged. We've got to go platinum and learn what their love language is.

As SOTH gathers for the Annual Meeting, and eventually, to call, welcome and install a new senior pastor, my prayers will be with you, even once our interim concludes. I am witnessing so many wonderful works of God among you and from you, that I can't help but be excited for all God will invite you to join next!

WHAT IS AMMPARO?

As the ELCA's AMMPARO contact at Shepherd of the Hills I occasionally receive social justice action alerts as well as notification of educational opportunities from both AMMPARO (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities) and the ELCA. The goal of these alerts is that Lutherans will communicate with their elected representatives about a particular piece of legislation or with a federal agency seeking the public's input on a proposed rule. Sometimes tips for those communications are also provided. These alerts are usually time sensitive due to votes in Congress or deadlines in the government's rule making process.

On February 23, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and Department of Justice (DOJ) proposed a new rule that would impose onerous new conditions on those seeking asylum. The proposed rule would disqualify certain migrants seeking asylum based on their manner of entry and transit to the U.S. southern border.

The American Immigration Council says of the proposal that, "People will be forced to navigate this process at the end of a grueling journey to the United States, with potentially lethal danger awaiting them at home if they fail."

Unfortunately, the deadline for comments on this rule was March 27.

AMMPARO also announced a live webinar about child labor in agriculture on March 28. The 300,000 to 500,000 estimated children who work in agriculture are the least protected workforce in the US by law. Labor laws protect and prevent children from working in factories or offices but allow children as young as 12 to legally work unlimited hours on farms outside of school with parental permission. The webinar was to teach ways one can take action and help make a difference for farm worker families.

Butterfly Pretzels

Celebrate being a new creation by making this fun spring snack.



What you need:

- 45 miniature twist pretzels (to make 20 butterflies)
- Cookie sheet covered with parchment paper
- Light cocoa and multicolored Candy Melts (available at craft stores)
- Disposable decorating bags
- M&M's, Skittles, sprinkles, cinnamon drops, etc.

What you do:

- 1. Break five pretzels into pieces for antennae.
- 2. On cookie sheet, arrange pairs of whole pretzels as shown.
- 3. Melt Candy Melts in microwave, separating colors into different bags.
- 4. Pipe melted brown candy down the center to hold pretzels together, making a head and body. Press on two pretzel pieces for antennae.
- 5. Pipe other melted candy into the pretzel holes.
- 6. Add M&M's and other decorations into melted candy on the wings. Let cool. Enjoy!
