"HEADPHONES ON, HEADPHONES OFF"

It was the last night of Middle School Summer Festival Camp and it had been a hot three days. Pastor Anne and I were at Gustavus Adolphus with students from Shepherd along with several other churches. The students had had a full 3 days of learning about Jesus, singing songs, playing games and now the last event of the night... A Dance Party!!

Not only a dance party but a Silent Disco Party! Each person was given a set of headphones that you could turn on. Once they were on, you had a switch on the side that you could move to three different settings or stations. Each setting/station had its own color that would light up on the headphones... blue, green and red. Once you had the headphones on, you could not hear anything else that was going on, only the music.

I'll give you an example of how this worked. Let's say I had my setting on blue and the song that was playing was Shake It Off by Taylor Swift. I would look around to see who else had their headphones on blue so that I might go and dance with them. If I looked around and a bunch of people had their headphones on red, I would switch mine to red to hear what they were listening to. Let's say it was the Cha Cha Slide by Mr. C. Then I could run over there and line dance with them. At the end of that dance, I looked around and some of the students had switched it to green and it was Let It Go from the movie Frozen. I would run to them, and we would sing our hearts out!

It was so great to see all the different groups forming together, not knowing each other, but just dancing and having fun. There were a couple of times during the Silent Disco Party that I would take my headphones off, and it was only then, that you could hear three different groups singing at the top of their lungs to their favorite song that they were listening to. And sometimes, you would see an individual, dancing to the music all by themselves, seemingly not having a care in the world.

This got me thinking about what songs/voices we listen to in our own lives. And how those songs/voices can influence us, get us all pumped up or turn us off and make us run to look for another voice to listen to.

What if, instead of having three different colors on our headphones that had three different stations, we imagined that the three colors represented the Father, Son and Holy Spirit?

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What if, when we had our headphones on, tuning out the rest of the world, we would be able to hear each voice of the Trinity? What if the red color told us "I love you", the blue color told us, "Go out and help your neighbor" and the green color whispered, "I will never leave you." How cool would that be?

Whenever you needed to shut the voices of this world out, whenever you needed encouragement or love or a little nudge, you could just put on your headphones and hear the voice of God!! And how great would it be to actually see and know who else was looking for support, friendship and relief!

Unfortunately, life isn't always that easy. Sometimes it requires searching and finding those who need help in this world, those who are lonely or those who have lost their way. And sometimes, it's not easy for us to ask for help either. And so, we keep our headphones off and listen to all of the chaos in the world and all of the voices that are the loudest. We start to shut people off because we can no longer hear them or the voice of God. We turn inward instead of looking for those who are dancing by themselves. We think only of our own needs instead of what is needed in our families, our church and our community.

I admit I have done this and am trying to do better. I have taken my headphones off for too long. I have forgotten to listen for the voice of God, forgotten to be still so I could hear. I have forgotten that God loves me for who God created me to be and that God wants me to help people who are in need of physical, emotional and spiritual uplifting.

I know that I am not alone in this. And so, I ask you today, to put on your headphones and listen for the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Experience God's presence in your life for healing, health and happiness. Look for others who are in need and find those who may be lost, lonely and forgotten. And when you do take off your headphones, stand up to the voices that do harm and join with the ones who are doing good in this world.

God longs for and desires us to listen to God's voice and be in community with others with headphones on and headphones off. As we listen to God for God's will to be done, we also continue to listen to the world in all of its chaos, trusting that God has a plan.

For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Jeremiah 29:11

May God bless you as you trust and listen to God's voice and serve SOTH, your neighbor and your community.


Call Committee News

By now, many of you have seen the call to action in recent weekly Shepherd e-News emails for those that filled out the electronic survey

prior to July 26th. If not, the following italicized message below is what you've missed:

YOUR URGENT ATTENTION is needed to address an issue the Call Committee encountered with the electronic survey!!!!

The initial survey solution used by the call committee previously allowed unlimited responses to surveys that were 10 questions or less. THE LAST REPORT ON THE MIRACLES AT SOTH AS REPORTED BY THE FAITH COMMUNITY NURSE

For those of you who are big fans of local author and book store owner, Louise Erdrich you might be familiar with an older titled book she wrote called: "The Last Report On the Miracles From Little No Horse". It is about a nun who fakes being male in order to respond to her call to be a priest. She (he) serves a remote Native or Original American reservation community

starting in 1912 for over 80 years. The insightful quotes related to the people and relationships in this book combined with their faith experiences are incredible. My favorite on the power and reality of love is this one:

"To love another human in all of her splendor and imperfect imperfection is a magnificent task. Tremendous and foolish and human.

It is magnificent because it's a generous gift of acceptance. It's tremendous because it goes against a culture that prizes only certain kinds of beauty.

It's foolish because other people may not believe we really do love them as they are.

And it is human because all of us are imperfect and our deepest connection to others often comes as a result of the wounds we share."

This quote largely summarizes what both I experienced from you all at SOTH over the 13 plus years and also what I hope might be the epithet on the tombstone of my ministry here, though I am painfully aware of times I failed at that.

The importance and power of being involved closely in a caring community where we can be seen for who we are and loved in our lifetime is of extremely high importance. I would wager a life abundant can not be lived without such a community. Most of us need a few of these types of communities in our lives to thrive.

A caring community ideally has as a base component of people caring for and loving one another for all their perfect imperfections as Erdrich names in the quote above. A God of grace is the very model of this kind of love. We love one another not because of who we are or who we are not, but because we simply are. We don't condone or love the imperfect acts or choices but we look for the good, recognize the effort to be better and help with that by lovingly caring for that person, often believing in them when they don't believe in themselves.

In the same way in faith communities each of us may encounter periods of unbelief. Here too, as a community of sisters and brothers we carry one another's faith for them while they travel through a time of doubt.

As I have written and said many times it has been my great pleasure and gift received to walk with many, many of you and yours in times of transition, crisis, medical challenge, and life changes of all kinds. Also to learn with you about important life wellness subjects like mental health, and our many other speaker subjects over the years. I am grateful for the ways you have walked with me with grace and love when I have experienced these challenges too. We reminded one another our greatest title is child of God.

Now the list of challenges and life transitions in this phase of my life leads me to other places professionally. Personally, my husband Don and I intend to remain active members here at SOTH and look forward to remaining in this community whose mission matches well with ours and whose community we love dearly and enjoy the care of also.
