"I Thank My God for All of You"

"I thank my God every time I think of you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. And I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work in you will bring it to completion on the day of Jesus Christ." Philippians 1:3-6

One of the most influential people in my life was my youth director, Brent Johnson. And there is one story that has defined my sense of self and God, and Brent is at the very heart of it. The story goes something like this... You might be surprised to learn that I've not always been as cool as I am now. (Insert your favorite sarcastic emoji here – I'd choose the basic eyeroll) But Brent was cool. Guitar playing, long hair wearing, outgoing, exciting youth director Brent was everything I thought was awesome when I was a senior in high school. And for some strange reason Brent liked me! Tall, skinny, dorky, short hair wearing, golf playing, saddle shoe wearing me. One day Brent called, as was his way of doing youth ministry and said, "I'm going to Target with some other kids, want to come with and we will go have dinner afterwards?" How could I resist? Off to Target I went and met Brent at the entrance. Thinking I would try and be cool, I grabbed one of those beautiful red Target shopping carts and thought... I'm gonna' surf this thing! I put my left saddle shoe wearing foot on the lower part of the cart and with my right gave a mighty push! Now, if this was a movie this would be the part where we would hit the "slowmo" action. Imagine a six foot four kid putting all his skinny weight on the bottom rack of an empty red Target shopping cart... now imagine that beautiful red Target shopping cart taking off like a rocked launched directly into the end cap display of toilet paper because, well... empty red Target shopping carts are not balanced for such a surfing activity and I hit the floor as the red rocket Target shopping cart took out the toilet paper like a bowling ball! "Clean up on aisle 2!"

I was horrified. Laying on the floor I thought Brent would just walk away. Instead, he came right up to me, looked me in the eye, held out his hand to pick me up and said, "I love you man." I was speechless. I am still sort of speechless to this day. Cool, long hair wearing, guitar playing, Brent loved tall, dorky, saddle shoe wearing, toilet paper aisle destroying me... I was stunned. It was the first time I remember physically feeling God's love.

Then, when I finally graduated from high school later that year and headed out on a new adventure, Brent wrote the above quote from Philippians in the Bible he gave me. "I thank my God for you," Brent wrote. "I pray for you," Brent wrote. "I love you," Brent wrote. And "I know God has good things in store for you," Brent wrote.

PARKING LOT SPRING UPDATE

Asphalt The final 2-inch wear course will be placed in June after some warm weather has had a chance to heat up the existing bituminous and dry out the subgrade. During the final overlay, any ponding issues will be resolved along with any damaged areas of the base course.

Landscaping Final grading of the landscaped areas and installation of the new landscaping will be completed mid to late May. The irrigation system will also be updated to service the newly landscaped areas.

Lighting The parking lot lighting upgrades are complete. All exterior fixtures have been upgraded to LED which are more energy efficient and require little to no maintenance for many years.

<u>Rain Garden</u> The final rain garden installation and landscaping will be completed in mid to late May.

SE Parking Lot Swale The swale along the west side of the SE lot will be completed mid to late May to ensure the water draining off the south lot flows to the SW corner and eventually offsite.

Staff Reflection



AT EVERY TURN: Insights from the Intern By Intern Pastor Anne Schaefer

Welcome to my little corner of the world. As an intern pastor, I am learning a great deal about what it means to be called to ministry. Each month, I will use this newsletter space to reflect on the

wisdom that has come my way. I will likely learn a great deal about God, the Church, this congregation, faith, myself and grace. Thanks for being part of my journey!

Lesson #1: Persistence really does pay off. FOUR WHOLE YEARS ago I entered a process called Candidacy which is the process to Ordination. This process parallels my seminary education. It helps to affirm God's call on my life and make sure I am mentally and emotionally healthy enough for ministry. Candidates like myself have three separate interviews with the candidacy committee that can be emotional, raw, brutal and all together stressful. These committee members are supposed to challenge your experiences, encourage your future in ministry and point out your flaws or "growing edges" as they like to call them.

I have recently checked the second to last box on the four-year timeline. The last box to check will be at Ordination. While each step was exciting along the way, this feeling of completeness is a bit overwhelming. My next step, the very last step, will come when I receive a call to a congregation (don't worry, this step doesn't come until my internship is complete, or even months after that... it might be a long while). At ordination, the bishop will come, and together with all the ordained pastors in my life will lay their hands upon my head and shoulders and ask for the Spirit to always lead me in God's ministry of Word and Sacrament. I am sure that I will bawl like a baby in this moment. But for now, I sit in this quiet, completeness knowing that God has been present with me and has helped me to persevere in running this race. Though this process feels nearly complete, I know that I will forever be growing and changing into the leader God is calling me to be. So I trust and am confident that "God who began a good work in me will carry it on to completion" (Phil 1:6). Thank you to those who have prayed for me and supported me along this journey. I am incredibly thankful.

> Lesson #2 for this Intern... I have already marked off "Holy Week" next year on my calendar. I really recently learned that while this is the most wonderful week in the Church calendar, it is also incredibly draining! For 2023 in the week after Holy Week the only words on my personal calendar will be "Recover, Reset and Restore."

A FRESH CANVAS

I love to paint. I go to the store, pick out a ton of samples and bring them back to see which one will be the perfect color for the room. I find joy in this creative process and when it is finished, I feel a sense of pride in my work.

Now painting things on a canvas... that's a different story. I consider myself a bit creative, but I'm also a rule follower, so I have a hard time just letting go and letting the paint brush take over.

One example of this is when our family went out to Colorado to visit relatives. We went to one of those places where you are with a group of people that all paint the same picture. The instructor walks you through each step, telling you which brush to use, etc. I, of course, was watching with a careful eye and listening intently to the instructions to get my painting "just right." Emily, on the other hand, was around 10 years old and was getting frustrated as she was having a hard time keeping up with the adults. At one point, I thought she was going to quit, but she stayed with it.

We painted a tree full of different colored leaves and I thought we all did a fairly decent job. At the end, our instructor said, "Now look at your tree and if you want to add anything to it to make it your own, do so now."

I thought, "I'll just put my initials in the bottom of the tree" as that seemed a safe thing to do without ruining what I had just created. I looked over at Emily and as I did, she took her brush and painted a black vertical line off of the branch of her tree. I thought, "What the heck are you doing Emily? You just ruined your beautiful painting!" She then drew a circle at the bottom of the line and said, "Look mom! My tree has a tire swing!"

Words that I will never forget. A painting created by a beautiful, innocent soul. A teaching moment for me and for all who are reading this.

I learned that day that we don't need to have everything perfect in order for things to turn out beautifully. We don't need to follow all of the instructions to achieve perfection. We don't need to adhere to all of the old ways of doing things if that means it limits our way of thinking and keeps us from having an open mind and heart.

I also learned that by changing just one little aspect of a picture, it can change the whole meaning. That we can learn our best lessons from our youngest people and that it is truly never too late to change your perspective on things.



EASTER HAS PASSED, ARE YOU CHANGED?

It's May and hopefully we are finally reveling in the hope of actual spring!

This year, I am struck by reflecting on how for 40 days we consider Lent. We confess, we look deeply within, we consider our part in Jesus' journey to the cross and we long for the light, hope and grace that comes with Easter. But, as wonderful as Easter is, afterward we are still our sinful imperfect selves. We may be a bit more aware of forgiveness and grace that the cross brought us but we are still imperfect.

I have always struggled with my own imperfection. I have even realized over the years how the perfectionist tendencies of others around me can add an equally big layer of struggle. What do we do with our impossible pursuit of perfection, knowing that while we strive to do better each day, we (and others we love) will forever be imperfect while on this earth?

I have decided to look for the beauty in the imperfect. Like the famous Japanese art (Kintsugi bowls) where the vase is broken and reassembled with a gold adhesive. The vase with its new gold veins has more beauty than the vase before it was broken. The vase is also stronger, more resilient than it was before, too. Imperfection in humans demands growth. With each imperfect act or flaw we learn something; we feed our growing edge and add to our wisdom.

The forgiveness and grace that is a result of the events of Easter recognizes our imperfection.

When I look at my kids, I see each of their individual imperfections. If I take time to think about it, I don't love them less for them but instead love them even more for their humanness and uniqueness. And if I really think about it, I am often looking at my own imperfection showing through them as they share my DNA and were nurtured by me. Admittedly, it is harder to see my own imperfections with the same love, but I am working on it! My faith and relationship with God, occasional time with my therapist and having loving people around me help the most.

What is the message in your head about your own imperfections? What about the imperfections of those around you? Can you see them for their beauty? Do you see the growth that can or does come from them? Does it add to your sense of resilience? If not, how can you rewire the negative message in your head? Is there a trigger or a mantra that can help you?

Reminding yourself you are a Child of God, loved and forgiven is a start. This is the real Easter.
